| tourism |  | When people temporarily travel to a place for enjoyment. |
| location |  | The position of a place. We can describe precise location using co-ordinates, or in relation to other features (e.g. the town is located next to a river). |
| locality |  | An area and its surroundings. |
| human features |  | Anything built or created by humans (e.g. cities, roads, or bridges). |
| physical features |  | A natural element of the Earth (e.g. mountains, rivers, or seas). |
| Interdependence |  | Where people and places rely on other people and places to work properly. |
| seasonal |  | Patterns that can be identified at certain times of the year. |
| economy |  | How a place makes and spends money. |
| impact |  | The positive/negative effects an event or activity has on people, places, or the environment. |
| infrastructure |  | The basic structures and facilities essential for a place to function (e.g. roads, bridges, power supply, and water systems). |
